## Chapter 1

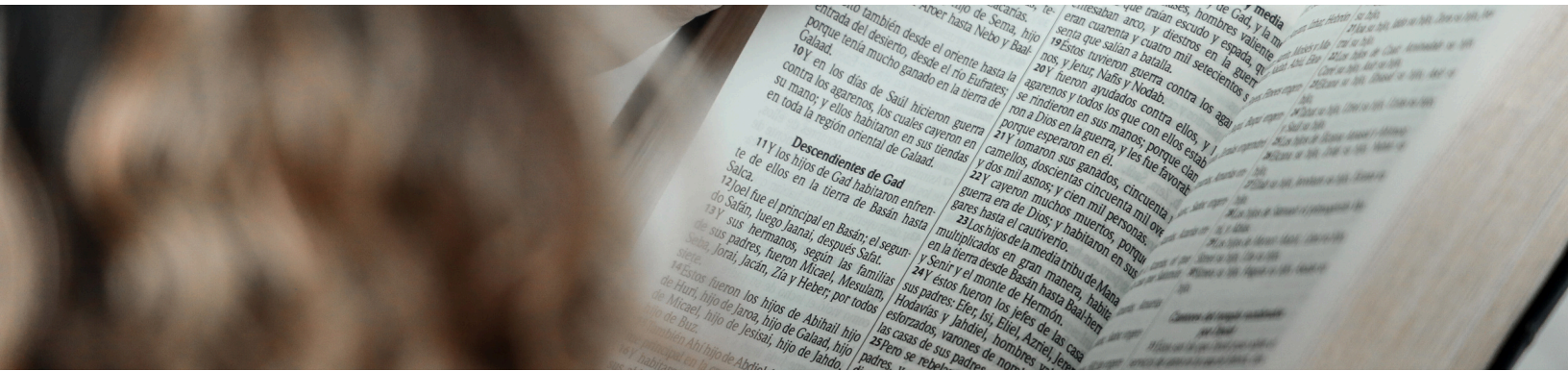
