Before / During / After Application Checklist

Stage	Installer Check
Before Application	Inspect the roof, verify suitability, repair active leaks or defects, confirm warranty considerations, clean the surface, test an inconspicuous area, and confirm weather conditions.
During Application	Stir product before use, protect surrounding property, control overspray, apply from the low point upward, maintain steady pressure, overlap passes, and monitor wet-edge transitions.
After Application	Protect the treated roof during curing, clean wet spills immediately, document product usage and conditions, and communicate homeowner care and maintenance expectations.

1. Purpose of Application Guidelines

These guidelines establish a consistent professional standard for Authorized Installers and help reduce avoidable application mistakes.

- Help installers prepare properly before applying product.
- Support product performance and customer confidence.
- Reinforce that application must follow current Vital Coat® instructions, SDS, Product Data Sheet, and warranty requirements.

2. Product Use Summary

Shingle Shield MAX™ is a professional grade roof sealer designed for direct application to asphalt shingle substrates. It penetrates the shingle surface and cures into a clear, breathable, hydrophobic protective film.

- Designed for preventive maintenance and restoration on residential or commercial asphalt shingle roofing systems.
- Helps improve water resistance, reduce surface erosion of the granule layer, and support visual uniformity with a low-gloss clear finish.
- The product is water-based, low VOC, non-flammable, and formulated for professional contractor use.
- This product is not a repair product for active water leaks or structural roof defects.

3. Technical Application Snapshot

The following technical items from the TDS should be reviewed before field use.

- Primary substrate: asphalt shingles only, when clean, dry, structurally sound, and suitable for coating.
- Optimal ambient range: above 50°F and below 85°F. Do not apply below 45°F or above 95°F without guidance.
- Roof must be 100% dry. Substrate temperature should be at least 5°F above dew point, and relative humidity should not exceed 85%.
- First coat coverage rate: 150-200 square feet per gallon.
- Optional finish coat coverage rate: 300-450 square feet per gallon.
- Allow first coat to dry at least 30 minutes before a finish coat. Typical recoat window is 0.5-2 hours at 77°F and 50% RH.
- Protect from water, dew, heavy condensation, and debris during curing. Water resistance is typically achieved after 24 hours; full cure is typically 72 hours.

4. Installer Responsibility

Authorized Installers are responsible for understanding the product before use and reviewing current product documents before application.

- Do not rely on outdated saved copies if updated guidance is available.
- Follow safety, preparation, weather, coverage, cure, cleanup, and application instructions.
- Verify suitability for the specific roof substrate and project conditions before full application.

5. Required Documents to Review

Before application, installers should review the current documents and notices that apply to the product and project.

- Safety Data Sheet.
- Product Data Sheet or Technical Data Sheet.
- Application instructions.
- Warranty information and registration requirements.
- Terms and Conditions.
- Any job-specific instructions provided by Vital Coat®.
- Any updated notices in the Member Portal or Resource Library.

6. Initial Roof Assessment and Warranty Verification

Perform a comprehensive roof inspection before application to evaluate the overall condition of the shingles and confirm that the roof is appropriate for Shingle Shield MAX™.

- Confirm the roof is structurally sound and that shingles are not loose, broken, missing, or excessively deteriorated.
- Repair active roof leaks and structural defects using appropriate roofing materials before product application.
- Verify with the shingle manufacturer whether application could affect an existing roofing warranty.
- Do not apply over questionable conditions without guidance from Vital Coat®.

7. Surface Cleaning and Preparation

Surface preparation is critical to adhesion, appearance, and final application quality.

- The roof surface must be completely clean, structurally sound, and free of loose material, broken shingles, biological growth, moss, lichen, mold, mildew staining, and contaminants.
- Professional low-pressure roof cleaning methods are recommended to avoid unnecessary granule loss.
- The roof must be 100% dry at the time of application; damp substrates can cause haziness, blushing, or loss of adhesion.
- Confirm shingles are free of prior water-repellent treatments or contaminants that could prevent penetration and adhesion.

8. Pre-Application Test Area

Before full application, test Shingle Shield MAX™ in an inconspicuous area of the roof.

- Confirm adhesion, absorption, and visual appearance are acceptable.
- Review the test area for haze, discoloration, uneven absorption, or other concerns before continuing.
- Do not proceed with full application if the test area raises questions without first contacting Vital Coat® support.

9. Weather and Environmental Conditions

Installers should review temperature, wind, moisture, humidity, dew point, and forecast conditions before application.

- Do not apply if rain, heavy dew, freezing temperatures, or unsuitable weather is forecasted within 24 hours.
- Do not apply when the roof is damp or when condensation may form during application or initial cure.
- Target application when ambient temperature is above 50°F and below 85°F; avoid application below 45°F or above 95°F without guidance.
- Substrate temperature should be at least 5°F above dew point, and relative humidity should not exceed 85%.
- Cure times increase in cooler temperatures and decrease in warmer conditions.

10. Product Handling, Mixing, and Storage

Product should be handled and stored according to official product documentation.

- Store in a cool, dry, well-ventilated area and keep containers tightly closed.
- Protect product from extreme cold, heat, moisture, contamination, direct sunlight, and freezing.
- Storage temperature range is 40°F to 95°F.
- Shelf life is up to one year in the original, sealed, unopened container.
- Stir contents before use to ensure proper mixing.
- Do not dilute, modify, or mix with unauthorized materials.
- If product appears hardened or separated, contact Vital Coat® before use.

11. Property Protection and Overspray Control

Shingle Shield MAX™ dries into a durable film and can be difficult or impossible to remove once cured on unintended surfaces.

- Never apply during windy conditions or when overspray drift may affect nearby property.
- Cover or relocate vehicles, patio furniture, windows, siding, landscaping, and other property within the potential drift zone.

- Avoid spraying solar panels, skylights, roof-mounted HVAC units, mechanical ventilation systems, and intake fans.
- Use drop cloths, cardboard shields, spray guards, or specialized edging tools at perimeters to control runoff and overspray.
- Do not mix, pour, load, rinse, or clean equipment over unprotected driveways, decks, sidewalks, lawns, gardens, or sensitive areas.

12. Equipment and Application Method

Use clean, functioning equipment that can deliver a consistent spray pattern and appropriate sealer thickness.

- A pump-style sprayer is commonly used, with a roller available for back rolling overspray when necessary.
- Tip selection, orifice size, and spray pattern should be selected by the professional installer based on equipment setup and roof conditions.
- Inspect nozzle tips frequently; worn or partially clogged tips can create heavy edges, streaks, or an uneven finish.
- Avoid equipment that drips, splatters, or produces runs.
- Clean equipment according to product and equipment instructions before material hardens.

13. Application Technique and Pattern Control

Apply in a controlled, consistent pattern to reduce streaks, buildup, and missed areas.

- Begin application at the lowest point of the roof and work upward to prevent runoff from streaking untreated shingles below.
- Hold the spray wand tip approximately 8 to 10 inches from the surface, adjusting slightly based on sprayer type and pattern.
- Use steady, even strokes across manageable work areas and avoid stalling at the turn of the stroke.
- Spray parallel to horizontal shingle lines where practical to help mask pattern transitions and edges.
- Target about 20% pattern overlap on each pass.
- Continue upward to a natural break point, then begin the next section at the low side and blend into the active wet area.

14. Cold Climate / Ice Dam Mitigation Technique

In regions prone to ice damming, installers may use an angled spray technique to help address shingle lap joints.

- Angle the spray wand tip slightly upward under the bottom lip of the overlying shingles.
- This helps push product into the lap joint and may reduce water backing up, freezing, and lifting shingles during winter conditions.
- Use this technique carefully to avoid excess product buildup, runoff, or uneven appearance.

15. Coverage Rates and Optional Finish Coat

Coverage varies based on shingle type, texture, age, deterioration level, and surface profile.

- First coat coverage rate: 150-200 square feet per gallon.
- Optional finish coat coverage rate: 300-450 square feet per gallon.
- Architectural shingles, irregular textures, degraded surfaces, or highly absorbent shingles may require additional material to achieve full coverage.
- Allow the first coat to dry for at least 30 minutes before applying an optional finish coat.

- Apply the finish coat thinner than the first coat, parallel to shingle lines, and offset passes slightly from first-coat pattern edges.

16. Curing and Post-Application Protection

Protect the treated roof during curing and do not disturb the treated surface.

- Do not touch the treated surface during curing.
- Do not add water or allow water, dew, heavy condensation, or debris to contact the surface during the initial curing window.
- Tack-free and dry-to-touch times are typically around 0.5 to 1 hour at 77°F and 50% relative humidity.
- Water resistance is typically achieved after 24 hours.
- Full cure is typically achieved after 72 hours, depending on conditions.
- Use extreme caution on treated surfaces, which can become slippery when wet.

17. Cleanup and Spill Response

Wet product should be cleaned immediately. Cured material may be extremely difficult to remove.

- Clean application equipment with the specified cleaner before material hardens.
- For wet spills, drips, or overspray, flush and saturate the affected area with clean water as quickly as possible and wipe with a clean wet cloth.
- If dried material lands on glass, allow it to dry completely and carefully scrape with a flat-bladed window scraper held at a shallow angle.
- Acetone may dissolve dried material, but it can damage plastics, paint, vehicle finishes, siding, trim, and factory coatings. Spot-test first and use sparingly.
- Once the material hardens, it may only be removable mechanically.

18. Safety and Personal Protective Equipment

Installers must read and follow the SDS before handling, mixing, or applying Shingle Shield MAX™.

- Use appropriate chemical-resistant safety goggles or face shield, protective gloves, long sleeves, and other PPE required by the SDS and jobsite conditions.
- Use OSHA-approved fall protection when working at heights or on roof surfaces.
- Maintain a clean, organized mixing station with adequate workspace ventilation.
- Keep unauthorized people, children, and pets away from the active work area.
- Follow all applicable laws, safety rules, local building codes, and roofing best practices.

19. Roof Care and Maintenance After Application

Proper roof care helps support the service life and appearance of the completed Shingle Shield MAX™ protection system.

- Inspect the roof at least twice per year and after major storms, high winds, hail, or heavy debris impact.
- Keep valleys, gutters, downspouts, and roof surfaces clear of leaves, pine needles, moss, and other organic debris.
- Trim branches away from the roof to prevent abrasion, granule damage, and pest access.
- Secure loose shingle tabs and periodically inspect penetrations, caulking, flashings, vents, and ventilation.
- Use professional soft-wash cleaning only; never use high-pressure washers, abrasive devices, or harsh chemical stripping agents.

- For snow removal, avoid scraping metal tools against the shingle surface.

20. Documentation and Records

Installers should keep appropriate job records and organize customer, warranty, and product information.

- Document date of application, product used, approximate quantity, weather conditions, roof condition, and project notes.
- Record whether a test area was performed and whether the roof was dry at application.
- Take approved jobsite or installation photos when permitted.
- Do not submit or share customer photos without permission.
- Keep warranty registration information tied to the homeowner and property.

21. Common Application Mistakes to Avoid

The following issues can reduce quality and should be avoided.

- Applying without reviewing current SDS, Product Data Sheet, and application instructions.
- Applying over active leaks, broken shingles, dirty surfaces, damp substrates, moss, lichen, or unsuitable conditions.
- Failing to verify existing shingle warranty considerations before application.
- Skipping the inconspicuous test area.
- Ignoring temperature, humidity, dew point, rain, dew, freeze, wind, or moisture restrictions.
- Using poor spray control, clogged tips, uneven passes, heavy edges, or insufficient overlap.
- Overapplying, underapplying, or applying unevenly.
- Failing to protect surrounding property from overspray, runoff, or spills.
- Making unsupported warranty or performance claims.

22. When to Contact Vital Coat® Support
